SEEDS of Support



At the Children's Home Network, we know the importance of extending educational support beyond the 60 boys and girls residing on campus in Kids Village. Programs such as SEEDS (Supporting and Empowering Educational and Developmental Services) and the Pinellas Support Team provide academic tutoring, and the necessary assessments of developmental, emotional, behavioral, and social needs of school-aged children and families.

7-year-old Ali was a struggling young student before joining the SEEDS program. When she first began receiving services, she was only able to recognize a few letters of the alphabet. She couldn't read, struggled with writing her own name, and could not count well. Simple tasks such as holding pencils and crayons were challenging, causing frustration, anger, and many tears.

SEEDS hosted a Family Team Conference and worked collaboratively to develop a plan for Ali's success. Ali received an extensive series of tutoring sessions to address her academic concerns, and her mother learned strategies for working with Ali at home through educational activities and establishing a learning space. Ali also received ABA therapy to reduce negative behavior and replace with positive behavior. After consistent support from the SEEDS team, Ali's mother and teacher reports she has made tremendous progress. Ali now recognizes letters, letter sounds, and sight words. She can now write her name and count and recognize numbers 1-20. Her academic improvements have also improved her social skills. Ali communicates more effectively and is often found singing songs in her free time. Her family is extremely grateful for the SEEDS program and the academic strides Ali continues to make in and out of the classroom.

Reaching and Inspiring Students Everywhere

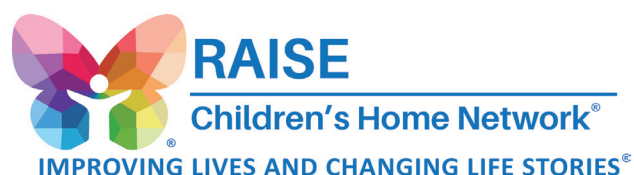


REACHING AND INSPIRING STUDENTS EVERYWHERE (RAISE) is one of the newest programs at CHN. RAISE works with families of children with a diagnosed disability, children with possible developmental delays, and children displaying disruptive or concerning behavior. RAISE services include collaboration with schools and the community to ensure children from birth through 3rd grade and their families receive the individualized services designed to meet their needs, and promote positive behavioral, developmental, and educational outcomes. CHN team members utilize evidence-based and evidence-informed strategies, including Motivational Interviewing, Trauma-Informed Care, and Infant Mental Health practices.

This newly funded program by the Children’s Board of Hillsborough County helps with the following:

- Children displaying disruptive or seriously concerning behavior, which is often attributable to adverse childhood experiences of trauma for children who have experienced the loss of a parent/caregiver or relative, homelessness, being bullied, or other traumatic events.
- Children with possible developmental delays that may affect a child’s readiness for school/academic performance. Children who are already diagnosed with a disability or impairment and struggling in areas affecting educational progress are also included in this category.

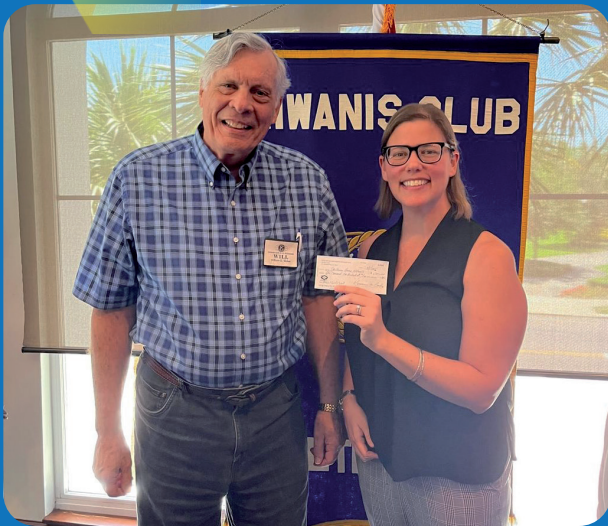

As part of CitiFinance's annual Global Community Day on June 8th, a group of hardworking Citi volunteers spent the day organizing our donation center. We are so grateful!



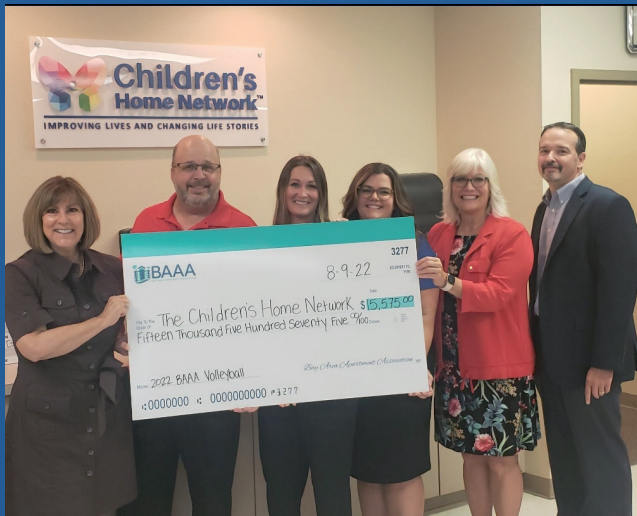

Caregiver Support Services



The Children's Home Network is excited to offer a new program in Pinellas County, Caregiver Support Services (CSS) that will offer comprehensive support to help prevent child abuse and neglect to at-risk families. This new service will help reduce household stress and provide respite care services. This will provide caregivers a much needed break and added support to meet their needs for community resources and improve their health and mental health. The program's target population centers on children ages 0-13 with physical disabilities, socioemotional challenges or developmental delays and their families. Services will be provided countywide beginning in October of 2022. More details coming soon!

Developmental Support Program



We are excited to share that the Children's Home Network is continuing to answer the unmet needs of children in foster care! Opening soon, CHN's developmental program (located on our Memorial Highway campus) will serve youth with developmental needs or ASD who will reside in a designated cottage with a nurturing and safe environment.

CHN recognizes the dramatic increase in the diagnosis of Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) among children. These include autism, blindness, and cerebral palsy, among others. ASD and other developmental needs must be properly and formally diagnosed to access effective services and interventions.

Families often struggle not knowing where to go or how to access these life changing resources. Many times, children go years without the formal diagnosis and without the proper services, their families become increasingly overwhelmed, hopeless and frustrated. Studies reveal that unfortunately, many parents are simply not prepared for the unique

challenges of raising a child with autism spectrum or developmental disorders, which requires significant patience, education, and training. This has the potential to lead to abuse and could result in the children being removed from the home and placed in foster care. Children with autism are 2.4 times more likely to enter foster care than their peers.

Every youth in the Developmental Support Program will receive trauma informed clinical and behavioral interventions to assist them with managing their developmental needs, traumatic experiences, and mental health needs while also teaching them positive and safe social, resiliency and communication skills. Also, children in foster care are at risk of sexual exploitation and harm, and youth with developmental needs are also vulnerable to harm and need protection and skills to keep them safe.

CHN's developmental program offers a robust clinical and social environment for children with developmental, sensory, social and other special needs to thrive and heal, promoting positive daily living and positive social skills within a supportive program. Our team works closely with the child's family, case managers, and child welfare partners to support the overarching case goals and to help the child maintain significant connections in their lives until they transition to a permanent living arrangement.

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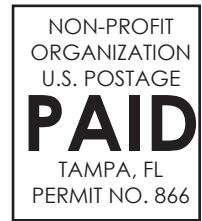
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
